- Was recently / regularly updated
- Is well documented
- Comes from a trusted source
- Fits with institution's needs, maintenance bandwidth, and tech stack
- Is standards based, uses up-to-date technology

How would you describe the impact to your work of using open source?



"It is completely transformative. There's no way we'd be able to release the software or exhibit media experiences we've created in the last decade without it."


"It's a great way to experiment without a large budget or enough IT support."

How big is your team working with open-source releases, on average? 22 responses




What are your goals in releasing open-source code?




What kind of code do you release? (check all that apply)

"Internally, it feels right to do it. Outside, I am not sure"


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
